School Sports Day

Due to a track double booking our Senior Sports Day made a late move to Thursday 19th June. Thank you to all who made it to Stockwood Park to cheer on the pupils from Years 5-10 as they competed on another hot day in the sun. Record performances are hard to come by as the pupils all do multiple events during the two hour competition. Nevertheless, there were five championship bests this year, all from the Y7/8 age group: Nneoma in the 80m, Eliya in the 300m, Matthew in the Shot, Jaden in the High Jump and the Campbell girls relay team. All but one of these pupils is from Campbell, but it was Jaden's Bunyan team who showed the strength in depth and came out on top in the end, winning for the third year in a row, with a comfortable margin of 21 pts over Campbell. ISA Regional Athletics

On Thursday 22nd May we took two minibuses to Bedford International Athletics stadium for the ISA Regional (London North) athletics championships. With events for pupils from Year 4 through to Year 11, it was a busy day, with hundreds of competitors from many different schools vying to win their event and thus qualify for the national champs. Despite taking a smaller team of 30 athletes this year, our pupils still had great success, with 9 qualifying to represent our region at the National champs in June. Many others also got personal best performances, as our athletes brought out their best at competition time. Some of our medallists are pictured, with our first ever relay team gold medal for the Year 7 girls (Nneoma, Florence, Daniella and Arit). This was a third gold of the day for Arit, who also won the 100m and Long Jump. Nneoma triumphed in the 200m, whilst Isaac (also in the pic) won the Y6 80m sprint and qualified for the relay. Piers (Y4) won gold in the 60m and three other sprinters made it to Birmingham, qualifying for their respective combined relay teams: Eri (Y4), Marie (Y5) & Oscar (Y5). Well done everyone for a great day of track & field!

District Champs

This year's district athletics champs moved to Jarman Park, Hemel, on Thursday 12th June, and saw 22 of our Secondary pupils competing against the best from the large secondary schools in St Albans & Harpenden. A special mention this year must go to two pupils. Firstly, Arit (Y7), who broke the district record for 200m twice in one day! She won the heats in 27.5, taking a huge 0.7 secs off the previous record, and then topped that with 27.4 in the final (pictured). An amazing achievement considering she also ran in the relay heats and final and competed in the long jump! Secondly, Matthew (Y8) took double gold, winning his first ever Triple Jump competition by over 1m and matching Arit's feat by storming home in the 200m (pictured). A brilliant effort! There was also a bronze for Nneoma (Y7 – pictured) in the 100m and a silver medal for the Y7 relay team (pictured), our first ever district relay medal! Well done to all who took part.

ISA National Champs

Another trip to the fantastic Alexander Stadium was the reward for our regional qualifiers (pictured), as we ventured up the M1 & M6 on Monday 16th June for the ISA National champs. Six hours of competition began with a Para athletes race at 12pm, with Alex Bell (GB 800m runner) presenting the medals throughout the day. Our group of 9 had a great day and all performed really well, in what is a high level of competition.

Arit (Y7 - pictured) had another very successful comp, winning the 100m to pick up our 5th Gold medal since we began competing in 2018 – a great effort for a small school like ours, considering ISA has over 600 schools in its membership! Later in the afternoon a 6th Gold was added to our cumulative tally as Marie (Y5 - pictured) helped her 4x100m relay team to 1st place.

There were also relay medals for Oscar (Y5 – Silver) and Isaac (Y6 – Bronze) as well as a bronze for Arit in the Long Jump. Well done to all involved and thank you to our support squad of Mrs Ball & Mrs McPherson.

Christian Schools Sports Day

Every year our school organises an athletics meet for Christian schools from around the country. Two (Witney & Southampton) are a similar size to our school, with 7 other smaller schools of various sizes. It is a day where there are impressive, competitive performances mixed with a great atmosphere and where every runner is cheered to the line. Our pupils really enjoy meeting those from other Christian schools, and this year was no different, as our team of 41 pupils competed across the three age ranges: Y5/6, Y7/8 and Y9-11. After many years of winning most of the trophies, as we did most recently in 2023, the scores have generally been more even over the last five years, and it was last year's champs from Witney, near Oxford, that took most of the trophies home this year. Our Inter girls won their age category and there were many notable individual performances, including new championship records for Arit (100m – 12.8secs) and Matthew (200m - 24.2secs).







Y9 Trip to Wales

Year 9 had a lovely week of activities in Wales back in May. It stayed dry all week, which was a blessing, with cooler temperatures to begin with, before it warmed up as the week progressed. We began with climbing on the sheer rock faces that tower up from the River Wye, as it meanders on it's way to Chepstow. Day Two saw the group take on a 5 hour circular walk, that took in the peaks of Corn Du and Pen-y-Fan (pictured), the latter being the highest peak in southern Britain. After having great fun playing at a local park in the evening, we enjoyed a curry and evening bible studies. The pupils helped with the cooking all week and did a great job. Thursday began with abseiling and then a drive back to the Brecon Beacons for Gorge Walking (pictured), which was the favourite activity for many. We capped off a great trip with a stunning canoe journey, seeing herons, salmon and nesting swans as we navigated the River Wye from Monmouth to Whitebrook. 
Bible After School Club

Pupils worked on a range of exciting algorithm-based projects, including creating a scrolling name badge, programming a rock-paper-scissors game, developing a step counter, animating a beating heart, designing an emotion badge to display different facial expressions, and coding a nightlight that responds to changes in light. Each project allowed them to apply logical thinking and creativity, and it has been wonderful to see their confidence grow as they solved problems and experimented with their code.








Year 9 and 10 Visit Careers Fair


New growing beds for Primary


