You may remember from our Autumn term newsletter the unprecedented success our Table Tennis teams had at the district and county champs. They are levels 2 and 3 of a six-level national competition. The zone finals (level 4) took place on Saturday 14th January in Morpeth School, London.



Three of our teams played that day (U11 boys & girls and U13 girls) and all did so well that they made it through to level 5! The U11 girls progressed as

winners, so they qualified for a different day to the other two teams who were runners-up. The regional finals were a step up in level, but our players still played really well and got some great results (three 8-0 wins!), with Ryan (U11) remaining unbeaten. It proved the end of the road for all three teams, one step from nationals. A great effort all, you did us proud!

Year 3/4 class. They looked at the history, geography, food and culture, and even learned a couple of phrases in Italian. Their competitive juices ran wild when they each built a leaning Tower of Pisa. YEAR 6 - JAPAN

Year 6 learned about Japan. Mr Skipper (Trustee) and his wife spent an afternoon

sharing their experiences of Japan with the pupils. They learnt how to show respect by greeting and bowing to visitors. They also learnt how in Japan the school students do all the cleaning of the classrooms!

Mr Skipper related kintsugi, the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery, to how Jesus was broken so that we might be made whole, that even in our brokenness we can be restored and made beautiful.

unsupportable. We are currently setting up a new cloud managed digital system that will allow us flexibility to expand or reconfigure quickly if and when the need arises. As an



themselves, they then discussed their choices in pairs and were then given an emergency siren - resources were to be reduced and a new list had to be agreed - as a pair choice. Further alterations followed and pairs became groups of four as the task developed. We experienced agreement and disagreement, listening and negotiation - a slice of life, in other words. To finish, the pupils fed back on the task and shared what they had found the most challenging, weighing up the benefits of solo work, paired working and then group work. As a class we saw that some demonstrated leadership in various ways while others were excellent support participants. How important these transferable skills are, as our children mature and learn how to work with and alongside others.

INTERHOUSE COMPETITIONS CROSS COUNTRY RACE—18th January

Our annual cross-country race for Years 5-8 took place on a crisp, winter's day early this term, the low sun casting long shadows as the runners ran carefully across the frozen ground.
